- While this data shows that we have our work cut out for us it is important to remember this is testing students at the end of the year for their grade level. It is slightly lower than last year, but we now know where to start with our students.
- The junior and senior classes will have the opportunity to attend an overnight field trip in November to Raleigh, NC. This trip is scheduled to take place from November 21st to November 22nd. Dr. Martin is arranging college visits to both NC State and UNC Chapel Hill. In addition the students will also be able to tour the NC State Capitol Building, the NC History Museum, and the NC Natural Science Museum. This will be the first overnight field trip students will have had the opportunity to participate in since Covid, and we are confident it will be an enjoyable and educational experience.

Professional Development:

- Professional Learning Communities are meeting regularly for grades 4-12. We will be meeting in October to have individual data meetings with teachers. We will be reviewing iReady information, EVAAS, and NC Check In 1.
- All faculty and staff have to attend professional development and mental health training. This professional development is being planned by the counseling department and will take place on the teacher workday, Monday, Oct. 17th.

Classical Foundations Program (CFP) Update
October 1, 2022

1. T. K. Coleman of the Foundation for Economic Education has produced videos related to the school's ten values; the videos are shown to our middle and high school students each month. He returned to the school and spoke to students in grades 3, 6-8, and 9-12 on Friday, September 2. He was joined by Tim Behling of SUCCESSTEAM (North Augusta, S.C.).
2. The Classical Foundation Program's fall 2022 lecturer – recommended by advisory board member Matthew Morgen – is Ben Bayer, fellow and director of content at the Ayn Rand Institute. Dr. Bayer will speak to high

school students on November 3 on Rand’s novel *Anthem*, which is part of the school’s eighth-grade curriculum, and on the importance of philosophy for life.

3. The Classical Foundation Program’s spring 2023 lecturer – recommended by advisory board member Thomas Pack – is Albert Eisenberg, co-founder of the Philadelphia-based media company Broad+Liberty. The date of the lecture will be arranged in the weeks ahead.
4. Mr. John Hood has agreed to be our 2023 graduation speaker on **Saturday, June 3, 2023**. His biography:

John Hood is president of the John William Pope Foundation, a Raleigh-based grantmaker that supports public policy organizations, educational institutions, arts and cultural programs, and humanitarian relief in North Carolina and beyond.

Hood also served as chairman of the board at the John Locke Foundation from 2015-2021. Hood helped found Locke in 1989 and served as its president from 1995 to 2014.

Since 1986, Hood has written a syndicated column on politics and public policy for North Carolina newspapers. It currently appears regularly in the *Winston-Salem Journal*, *Greensboro News & Record*, *Asheville Citizen-Times*, *Wilmington Star-News*, and newspapers in 50 other communities. Hood is a frequent commentator for radio and television stations and teaches at Duke University’s Sanford School of Public Policy.

Hood is the author of eight books, the latest of which is a Revolutionary War-themed historical-fantasy novel entitled *Mountain Folk* (2021). Hood’s other books include *Catalyst: Jim Martin and the Rise of North Carolina Republicans* (2015), *Our Best Foot Forward: An Investment Plan for North Carolina’s Economic Recovery* (2012), *Selling the Dream: Why Advertising is Good Business* (2005), *Investor Politics* (2001), *The Heroic Enterprise: Business and the Common Good* (1996), and two volumes of family history.

A former Bradley Fellow at the Heritage Foundation, Hood writes and comments frequently for national media outlets. His articles have appeared in magazines such as *Readers’ Digest*, *National Review*, *The New Republic*, *Military History*, and *Reason* as well as newspapers such as *The Wall Street Journal* and *USA Today*.

At Locke, Hood created the E.A. Morris Fellowship for Emerging Leaders, which prepares young North Carolinians for leadership roles in the public and private sectors. He also serves on the faculty and as board chairman of the N.C. Institute of Political Leadership; as co-chair of the North Carolina Leadership Forum, based at Duke University; as vice-chair of the James G. Martin Center for Academic Renewal and the Carolina Liberty Foundation; and on the boards of directors of the State Policy Network, the Student Free Press Association, and North Carolinians for Redistricting Reform.

Hood received his B.A. in journalism from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He earned a M.A. in liberal studies and a graduate certificate in nonprofit management from UNC-Greensboro. Hood currently serves on the UNC-Chapel Hill Board of Visitors. He is a Mecklenburg County native and currently resides in Wake County with his wife, two sons, and a stepdaughter.
