Teacher Retention


- Beginning Teachers met on 4/26 at 3:45

Curriculum Item for Discussion

Since our founding in 2013, Pinnacle Classical Academy has proudly offered a college-preparatory education built upon the foundation of the Core Knowledge Sequence. More precisely, Pinnacle Classical Academy has proudly offered a college-preparatory education built upon the foundation of the 2010 edition of the Core Knowledge Sequence.

Earlier this year, the Core Knowledge Foundation published a 2023 edition of the Core Knowledge Sequence. Our initial examination of the 2023 Core Knowledge Sequence reveals significant continuity, some changes that we believe are improvements, and other changes that we believe may raise questions in the minds of some within the classical and broader educational communities.

The administrative team will engage in a thorough review of the 2023 Core Knowledge Sequence during the summer and fall semester. The administrative team unanimously seeks

- the blessing of the board for the school to continue to use the 2010 Core Knowledge Sequence during the 2023-24 school year while we thoroughly review the changes the 2023 Sequence
- the blessing of the board for the administration to explore other curricula in use at classical schools around the country for potential curricular enhancements, in a manner consistent with state testing requirements. Examples of these programs include the curriculum of the Classical Latin School Association and Dr. Anika Prather's curricular recommendations, which we are learning more about at the recommendation of a PCA Classical Foundations Program advisory board member; this curriculum draws on the African-American classical education tradition.

Our goal is to present to the board's curriculum committee by March 31, 2024, a curricular proposal

that would incorporate what we believe to be a blend of the best elements of the 2010 Core Knowledge Sequence, the 2023 Core Knowledge Sequence, and other classical curricula – with the eventual goal of publishing this synthesis on our website as Pinnacle Classical Academy's Classical Curriculum.

Classical Foundations Program (CFP) Update May 1, 2023

- 1. T. K. Coleman's monthly videos, based on the board's Values Statement, are shown each month to students in middle school and high school homerooms. In April, the theme was esteem; in May, the theme is pride.
- 2. The Classical Foundation Program has begun to receive donations for an area of the new library devoted to classical literature and books consistent with the mission of the program. The library is envisioned as a research library for students and community members, rather than a circulating library.
- 3. Mr. John Hood has agreed to be our 2023 graduation speaker on **Saturday**, **June** 3. His biography:

John Hood is president of the John William Pope Foundation, a Raleigh-based grantmaker that supports public policy organizations, educational institutions, arts and cultural programs, and humanitarian relief in North Carolina and beyond.

Hood also served as chairman of the board at the John Locke Foundation from 2015-2021. Hood helped found Locke in 1989 and served as its president from 1995 to 2014.

Since 1986, Hood has written a syndicated column on politics and public policy for North Carolina newspapers. It currently appears regularly in the *Winston-Salem Journal*, Greensboro *News & Record*, Asheville *Citizen-Times*, Wilmington *Star-News*, and newspapers in 50 other communities. Hood is a frequent commentator for radio and television stations and teaches at Duke University's Sanford School of Public Policy.

Hood is the author of eight books, the latest of which is a Revolutionary War-themed historical-fantasy novel entitled *Mountain Folk* (2021). Hood's other books include *Catalyst: Jim Martin and the Rise of North*

Carolina Republicans (2015), Our Best Foot Forward: An Investment Plan for North Carolina's Economic Recovery (2012), Selling the Dream: Why Advertising is Good Business (2005), Investor Politics (2001), The Heroic Enterprise: Business and the Common Good (1996), and two volumes of family history.

A former Bradley Fellow at the Heritage Foundation, Hood writes and comments frequently for national media outlets. His articles have appeared in magazines such as *Readers' Digest*, *National Review*, *The New Republic*, *Military History*, and *Reason* as well as newspapers such as *The Wall Street Journal* and *USA Today*.

At Locke, Hood created the E.A. Morris Fellowship for Emerging Leaders, which prepares young North Carolinians for leadership roles in the public and private sectors. He also serves on the faculty and as board chairman of the N.C. Institute of Political Leadership; as co-chair of the North Carolina Leadership Forum, based at Duke University; as vice-chair of the James G. Martin Center for Academic Renewal and the Carolina Liberty Foundation; and on the boards of directors of the State Policy Network, the Student Free Press Association, and North Carolinians for Redistricting Reform.

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Hood received his B.A. in journalism from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He earned a M.A. in liberal studies and a graduate certificate in nonprofit management from UNC-Greensboro. Hood currently serves on the UNC-Chapel Hill Board of Visitors. He is a Mecklenburg County native and currently resides in Wake County with his wife, two sons, and a stepdaughter 14
