# Curriculum/Academics/Data

- Middle School Mystery Reader
  - Starting this month we will be incorporating a new program that will give our 7th and 8th grade students a leadership opportunity as well as encourage the joy of reading.
  - As many as 10 middle school students will read a pre-selected book aloud to a 4th or 5th grade class during their scheduled library time. They will introduce themselves and ask a follow up question after reading.
  - All books are selected from our libraries and will align with PCA's core values: honesty, integrity, reality, reason, independent thinking, productivity, teamwork, justice, self esteem, and pride.
- Data Talks and Incentives
  - Teachers are doing a fantastic job hosting Data Talks with individual students. In the data talks
    they discuss current performance, an attainable goal for the future, and ways to make progress
    towards the set goal. They also remind students of the incentive for growth moving forward.
    All incentives are attainable for each student based on their previous data points and growth
    trends.

# **Professional Development:**

- iLEADR recently modeled how to assess student work in order to create purposeful, targeted groups of students in classrooms. They also modeled working in small groups with high performing students in order to help deepen their level of understanding.

The ACT College Admissions Assessment is given to all North Carolina public school students in the 11th grade. This is an "apples-to-apples" comparison.

The four sections of the ACT are each scored on a scale of 1 to 36. The following are mean scores, as published in the recently released state ACT report.

This report includes confidential SAS® EVAAS<sup>™</sup> (Education Value-Added Assessment System) data. As the Department of Public Instruction notes, "EVAAS examines the impact of teachers, schools, and districts on the learning of their students in specific courses, grades, and subjects."

EVAAS classifies this impact in three ways:

- Exceeded expected growth: "Significant evidence that the school's students made more progress than the Growth Standard"
- Met expected growth: "Evidence that the school's students made progress similar to the Growth Standard"
- Did not meet expected growth: "Significant evidence that the school's students made less progress than the Growth Standard"

The PSAT is taken in October of the junior year, and the results (in terms of growth) are extremely encouraging. It is typically taken only by college-bound students; at Pinnacle Classical Academy, it is given to all juniors, whether or not they are college-bound.

This is an apples-to-oranges comparison, in which all PCA students are compared to college-bound students nationwide.

The minimum score on each section of the PSAT is 160; the maximum score on each section is 760. The minimum total score is 320; the maximum total score is 1520.

#### **SAT Scores**

The minimum score on each section of the SAT is 200; the maximum score on each section is 800. The minimum total score is 400; the maximum total score is 1600.

Because North Carolina administers the ACT to all students, very few North Carolina students now take the SAT. Pinnacle Classical Academy, however, pays to administer the SAT to as many students as possible: some students will do better on the SAT than on the ACT.

# As a result, this is not an apples-to-apples comparison, but:

- in North Carolina, an apples-to-elite comparison, in which all PCA students are compared to the most ambitious students who take the SAT as well as the ACT
- nationwide, an apples-to-oranges comparison, in which all PCA students are compared to college-bound students

Pinnacle Classical Academy's Class of 2023 earned the highest score in the school's history on the SAT.
